LEARN

When you are done with the shops, spend some time to take in the rich heritage of the arts and heritage district in Singapore's civic centre. Besides being a shopping paradise, Bugis also houses several architectural sites that preserve the culture of days past in Singapore.

#### Malay Heritage Centre

Trace the history and material culture of the Singapore Malays as well as their contributions towards nation-building. Built 160 years ago by Sultan Ali, the son of Sultan Hussein Shah, the Istana Kampong Glam is home to the Malay Heritage Centre. Jalan-jalan through the sprawling grounds to explore the artefacts, murals and multimedia displays across nine galleries.

## LAH

Used at the end of sentences to indicate tone of anger or agreement e.g. Yes lah... / Yes lah!

## LEH

Used at the end of sentences to sound more placating in a disagreement or to persuade e.g. No leh... / Yes leh, he did leh. / Go leh.



Used at the end of sentences to agree or give in e.g. Ok lor. / Go lor.

## MEH

Used questioningly e.g. No meh? / Yes meh?

## WAH

Exclamation to express shock or disappointment e.g. Wah lao! / Wah lao... How could he do that?

## ALAMAK

Exclamation to express when one makes a mistake e.g. Alamak, I forgot my passport!



Sorry; used to express embarrassment or apology e.g. Paiseh, I didn't mean to knock into you.



Crazy e.g. Siao! That's davlight robberv.

Tastes or feels good e.g. This burger/massage is so shiok!
